### **Essential Information**

### **Programme Details**

The programme seeks to develop a teaching and learning culture that cultivates the inquisitive and creative mind. The programme aims to provide students with the knowledge, skills and competence to establish a Creative Photographic Practice by developing their critical and analytical powers in relation to the discipline.

The course is a three-year full-time programme of study and is split into terms as shown below. It is important to remember that the nature of the full-time course require you to contribute approximately 40 hours per week. While this may vary week-to-week and may need to be balanced with any part time jobs, but do remember that you shouldn't schedule any employed-work during your taught sessions. You'll see that your taught timetable runs on a Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday, with the Friday for self-directed study which will entail being on campus working in the studio or workshops developing and improving your project work, accessing the library resources, other workshops and IT facilities. This timetable will be fully explained to you in your Welcome Week briefing.

The programme encourages students to develop an autonomous creative practice and team-working skills whilst facilitating the growth of critical, experimental, and analytical problem-based learning skills.

The curriculum is made up of three clear components informally known as: *Subject, Field,* and *Constellation*.



- **Subject** grounds students as photographers. These modules provide a space in which students can hone their knowledge, skills, and understanding with specific regard to photography.
- Field modules provide students with opportunities to collaborate with others and explore new skills and experiences with which to further their individual specialist practice.
- Constellation provides contextual, theoretical, and historical underpinning that encourages students to position their practice within transdisciplinary contexts and to challenge the perceived boundaries of their specialist discipline.

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#### Working Ethic -We expect our students to:

- Be proactive and ambitious to initiate and develop creative ideas with conceptual rigour across a wide range of photography briefs and personal projects.
- Take responsibility for their learning be well informed about their modules, assignments, deadlines and submission requirements




### Meet the Team

I will be teaching you across all three years of the course including projects on Monochrome Aesthetics, Urban Futures and Site/Venue as well as the History and Theory modules Modernism and Beyond, and Contemporary Photography and Visual Ethics. With a background in Fine Art and Photography and as an Academic Researcher my interests include Conceptual Art and Photography, Collaborative Art, and Activism.

In my own work I combine photography with drawing, text and maps and have written about photographers and artists who make work in and about urban spaces and ecologies. I am looking forward to working with you to develop your own distinctive photographic practice.



My name is Michal Iwanowski and I will be teaching you predominantly on Level 5 and 6 in projects such as *Narrative: Fact & Fiction,* and *The Photobook.* I will be focusing on helping you define your distinctive photographic voice, and I aim to equip you with tools necessary for the development of meaningful, sustainable artistic practice.

I work at the intersection between photography, video and creative writing. I am a firm believer that the personal becomes the global, and I examine the role of landscape as witness to personal narratives. I'm known to incorporate long distance walking into my work, from Wales to Poland for example. I am looking forward to working with you.





Hello I am Jude Wall. I will be working with you across all three years of the course, with a specific responsibility for Level 4 and Level 5 projects *The Constructed Image, Photographic Perspectives and Contemporary Photographic Practice,* as well as supporting students with independent projects in their final year.

I have a broad range of research interests in photographic practice. My current work focusses on memory trauma and the use of alternative processes. I am keen to push the boundaries of photography and explore ways in which visual communication allows the narrative to unfold. I work with a range of practitioners on editing and sequencing their work and ensure that I maintain a focus on contemporary developments in the medium.



I'm Tom, I am the Technical Demonstrator (TD) for Photography at Cardiff School of Art and Design. Throughout your first year I will be working on a range of projects with you, running practical skills-based workshops. These will cover a whole range of photographic processes including working with traditional methods, working digitally, using the photography studio and postproduction.

I will also be your point of call for any equipment or resource requests you have during your time with us. As a practicing artist, my work involves the use of alternative photographic processes as a way of researching and understanding sustainability within photography.

### Programme Activities and Projects

Within Photography the main teaching and learning strategy is the Project. Projects are of relatively long duration and are intended to broaden the student's intellectual and creative abilities. They seek to promote an attitude of critical analysis which challenges prior assumptions and aims for genuine innovation.

Several types of project are used:

- *mandatory projects*: staff-set with prescribed objectives and outcomes
- student-led projects: determined by individual students in consultation with staff
- 'live' projects: set by outside or Institute-based clients in consultation with staff

Within a project a number of activities take place. These include:

- *briefing sessions*: used to clarify project objectives and limitations.
- *Lectures:* used to deliver new concepts and inspire ideas. They are supported by visual material and/or textual material.
- *project critiques*: used to give students the opportunity to present and justify their work to their year group and to staff.
- *workshops*: offering a range of practical and theoretical skills.
- *exercises*: used to define and clarify specific aspects of the design process.
- *demonstrations*: to promote 'learning through example'.
- presentations: intended to encourage creativity, clarity and confidence in the oral and visual presentation of group or individual work.



### Social Activities

- Group visits to private views of minimum of 3 exhibitions a year (Ffotogallery, National Museum Wales, and other local Galleries)
- Group trips to London normally 1-3 day visits per year to explore major photography exhibitions (Photographers Gallery, Tate Modern, V&A Photography Collection etc.)
- Photography Talks a programme of talks by practising Photographers and Artists as well as Creative Industry specialists, including Curators and Photo Agencies
- Gallery Crawls and Studio Visits a chance to visit and talk to local galleries and artists and learn more about how they operate
- Portfolio Reviews with Ffotogallery, a chance to meet and get feedback on your portfolio with an Internationally renowned Photography gallery team
- Extra-Curricular Groups Join our Fashion and Events Team to get experience of working with clients
- Day trips for Location Shooting and other Photo related fun
- Photomarathons and Fundraisers

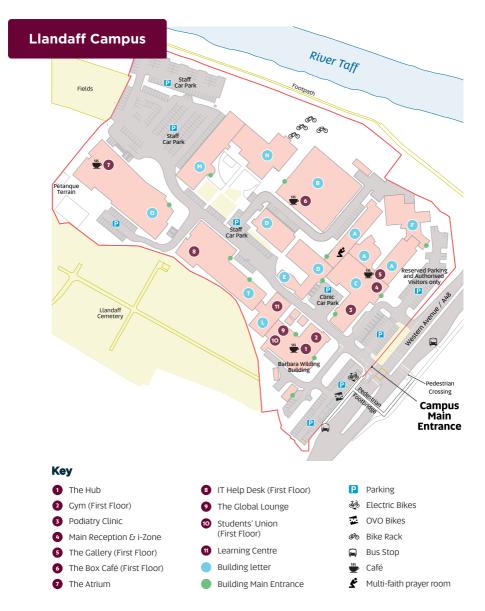
