
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Introduction

Programme Details

The Cardiff Met BSc (Hons) Criminology degree combines both theoretical and empirical study into a modern programme that will challenge the way you look at the study of crime.



In addition to learning about the underpinning philosophies and theories that explore crime as an academic field of study, BSc (Hons) Criminology students will explore the evidence base for these theories and philosophies, and potentially contribute towards our developing understanding in a range of cutting-edge topics.

Studying Criminology at Cardiff Met, you will focus on three key strands that are woven throughout the degree which include Criminology Theories, the fundamentals of the Criminal Justice System and Emerging Disciplines in contemporary Criminology.

Part-Time Students

Whilst full-time students should participate in everything, we recognise you may not be able to do everything because of other commitments, and we understand this.

Talk with your Personal Tutor about which activities will be most valuable for you. You will be welcome to join in all events during the week, as and when you can. Do, though, ensure that you have registered, and completed the required paperwork before attending any events.

Lewis is a Senior Lecturer in Professional Policing. He has 13 years policing experience across two forces: Hampshire Constabulary and later South Wales Police. She spent 10 years in detective roles and 7 years as a Detective Sergeant on a Child Abuse Investigation Team, so has a particular interest in criminal investigations and safeguarding. She holds a BSc (Hons) degree in Psychology.



James McCormack

James is a lecturer in Professional Policing and Criminology. He worked as a Crime Scene Investigator for South Wales Police for nearly six years where he examined a myriad of crime scenes ranging from criminal damage to murder. He was involved in several high-profile murder cases during his tenure. He worked alongside multiple departments whilst at South Wales Police including CID, Major Crime, PPU, and various external agencies. He holds a BSc in Forensic Biology and an MSc in Analytical and Forensic Science and is currently pursuing his PhD in Criminology, researching the decision-making and sense-making of Crime Scene Investigators at scenes of sudden and suspicious deaths. He has a keen research interest in death investigations, police decision making and use of forensic science within criminal investigations.



Hannah Dastgir

Hannah is a Lecturer in Professional Policing and has previously taught Policing at the University of the West of England. Hannah also has the policing experience and has worked across various units including neighbourhood response, the domestic abuse unit and CID, where she obtained specialist skills as an advanced suspect interviewer, ABE-trained interviewer and a sexual offences liaison officer. Hannah holds a bachelor's degree in BSc Criminology with Forensic Science and a master's degree in MSc Criminology and Criminal Justice.



Dr Nicholas Louis

Nick is a lecturer in Professional Policing and Criminology. He has over ten years of police experience with the West Tennessee Judicial Violent Crime and Drug Task Force and the City of Germantown Tennessee Municipal Police, in the US. He has worked as a criminal investigator, interstate interdiction agent, police K-9 officer, motor vehicle crash reconstruction expert, and patrol officer. He was also a field training officer and specialist law enforcement instructor in police officer safety, dangerous drug investigations, and impaired driving enforcement. He has a PhD in Law from the University of Westminster, Master of Laws with Distinction in International Law from the University of Westminster, and a BSc (Hons) degree in Criminal Justice from Loyola University Chicago.



Programme Activities and Project

The welcome week project will give you the opportunity to work with the other new students on your course on a group activity. At the end of the week, your team will present your findings to each other in your tutorial groups.



The task, called Metville 2023, asks you to imagine yourself working in a community safety team that has been tasked to create a 'safer futures' document that centres around a proposed hypothetical location known as Metville.

In your group, you will create a short presentation that features the top 10 recommendations for building a safer Metville 2023. These recommendations will be based on the underpinning principles of Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design and offers you the chance to work with your team and make new friends before lectures start.

Freshers' Fayre

The Freshers' Fayre, organised by the <u>Students' Union</u>, is your first chance to meet all our <u>SU Societies</u>, <u>SU Sports Teams</u> and of course a chance to grab all manner of freebies from our commercial partners! The fayre is an all-day event taking place on Wednesday within NIAC on the Cyncoed campus! It is one of the highlights of the Freshers calendar and one of the only times during your university journey that every student from all Cardiff Met schools will be in the same place!


