

# **Summer Project**



**OVERVIEW** 

Developing and finding your own unique voice as an illustrator is one of the primary concerns of the course. Finding your style or as we prefer 'visual language' will be your way of visualising your ideas and communicating to an audience.

It is important that you are open to experiment with this over the next 3 years and allow your work to evolve. Different materials and media will communicate different qualities in the imagery you are making— is it loud, quiet, serious, witty, elegant, graphic etc?

In Term 1 you will be expanding upon this by introducing more content with observation, personal viewpoint and narrative.

#### THE BRIEF

Working to a format of a 16 cm x 16 cm square, create x 10 in response to <u>each</u> of the categories below:

Film stills	Footwear
Wild Animals	Weather
Trees	Buildings
Modes of transport	Landscapes
Domestic Objects	Toys

When you have finished you should have a <u>total of 100 16 cm x 16 cm squares</u>. For **each of your responses within each category you should work in different media** and consider the material qualities of the subject you are working with. For example, an item of footwear might be old, battered, shiny, clumpy or spikey. It might be a heel, flipflop, sports shoe or kept for best. How can you respond to this visually? Look for ways to bring in your own personal interests, objects and possessions.

As a reminder to not simply repeat yourself with image-making, you may want to consider some of the approaches below:

Draw	Collage	Be messy
Make marks	Use wet media	Be neat
Express feelings	Use dry media	Observe
Work in 3D	Print	Imagine
Take photographs	Cut / fold	Mix media

Additionally, you should give consideration to the composition and choice of colour of each response. We will be reviewing this work during **Welcome Week** so please bring it with you. It would be helpful if your work is on loose sheets rather than in a sketchbook, so that it is easy to display.

## Research Task

In the age of viewing so much illustration on social media, it is important to be aware of the key figures from history who inform the work of today. Try not to make judgement about whether you like it or not, the simple fact is it has impacted contemporary illustration. We would like you to familiarize yourself with the work of the following artists/ illustrators who have impacted contemporary illustration and <u>select 3</u> to collect examples of their work to tell us about:

- The dates and place in which they were /are working,
- The distinctive features of their work,
- Any reoccurring themes or subject matter,
- Where their work is seen (e.g, books, design, exhibition, mural etc).
